Tenaflly High School is celebrating the acceptance of junior Chaeyoung Lee to the New Jersey Governor's School in the Sciences to be held at Drew University.

Established in 1983, the Governor's School of New Jersey is a tuition-free, summer, residential program for high-achieving high school seniors who have an interest in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) subjects.

Currently, there are two programs: the Governor's School in the Sciences at Drew University and the Governor's School of Engineering & Technology at Rutgers University. The competitive program welcomes students from all over

the state.

"I was very excited to learn that I had been accepted," said Lee. "Science is my passion, and the chance to study science and participate in research at this level will be so rewarding and help me define what I want to study in college."

The program introduces scholars to a hands-on research experience in a student's area of interest through a series of courses, laboratories, projects, lectures, and other activities centered on math and science.

Students work with professors in Drew University's undergraduate science program, learning about possible career paths from the faculty and from some of New Jersey's leading industrial, governmental, and academic representatives.

It also focuses on students' ethical, social, and civic responsibilities.
